# SCIENCE

Welcome back to another great term of learning in science. This term we will be learning about Earth and Space so be sure to ask your children what they learnt during their lesson.

Below are a few photos that help celebrate the Term 3's Biological Science topic. In Prep students looked at the Living World and explored the basic needs and properties of living things. In Year 1 students observed the external features of living things. They described the features of both animals and plants and had to identify that living things live in different places to suit their needs. The Year 2 unit, Living Things Change, introduced students to the concepts of growth and change and explored how technology is used in the kitchen. In Year 3 students learnt that living things all have certain characteristics. Year 4 students learnt about the life cycles, their similarities, and differences. They looked at how animals and plants rely on each other for survival. In Year 5 students gained a better insight into the structural and behavioural features of living things that support their survival. The Year 6 unit, Living things in their Environment, focused on how changing physical conditions in the environment affect the growth and survival of living things.





The Playground Craze visited Coral Park today and encouraged students to develop confidence, resilience and kindness. The shows taught students to be safe and kind online. Students enjoyed learning about the importance of persistence, friendship and cooperation with Positive Pop Music which they found entertaining.







### SCHOOL WIDE POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT

School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) is a framework which we use across the whole school to model, acknowledge and reward positive behaviour. Everyone in the school community is aware of our behaviour expectations, as listed in our Behaviour Matrix, and using the SWPBS framework is an effective way of reducing negative and unwanted behaviour. By focussing on good behaviour choices, students are encouraged to gain attention by doing the correct thing, rather than getting attention for doing the wrong thing.

Students are given clear details of what positive behaviour looks like and there are posters and banners throughout the school as reminders of our school values and how to display them. Students choose a reward chart and gain stickers for positive behaviour and displaying school values, then when their chart is full of stickers, they can select a reward of their choice.



### Active Travel - Student wellbeing benefits of walking to school?

Active travel is one source of physical activity which comes with increased metabolism, improved cardiorespiratory fitness, and lower weight and BMI.

- Better academic performance children who are physically active on the way to school burn off some of their excess energy and are more able to settle down and focus well during lessons.
- 2. Children who walk or cycle to school suffer less from diabetes and obesity.
- Walking to school encourages a higher level of physical activity throughout the rest of the day.
- Secondary or high school students have fewer road accidents if their parents walked with them to primary school.

### **Importance of using the Schools Crossings**

Schools Crossings are an important part of our Road Safety Infrastructure. They are there to keep all pedestrians safe. Our Casey School Crossing Supervisors are trained to help children and adults cross the road safely.

In our safety surveys to our School Crossing Supervisors, **82%** of School Crossings Supervisors reported that some parents/carers/ students were seen to be not using the school crossing and choosing to cross the road further away from the crossing. This is dangerous for both pedestrians, drivers and often adds to the traffic congestion around school zones.

School Crossings are co-funded by VicRoads and regularly counted to ensure they are meeting funding requirements and community need. If a School Crossing is not performing over a time period (community are not using) they can be removed.

Please ensure families from your school always use the school crossings to cross the road safely.



### As a Pedestrian

Pedestrians must wait behind the yellow line at the crossing.

Your School Crossing Supervisor will stop the traffic.

Your School Crossing Supervisor will go out to the middle of the road.

Listen for two blasts of their whistle.

Walk in front of the School Crossing Supervisor to the other side of the road.

Adults are encouraged use the crossing as well as students – role modelling is important.

Walk, never run. Remember to get off your bike.

Balls must not be bounced while crossing the road.



### As a Driver

Drivers must not overtake a vehicle stopping/stopped at the School Crossing.

Keep the School Crossing Clear. Do not stop your car on the crossing.

Blocking the crossing is not only against the law, but also dangerous for everyone.

Drivers must stop if a child or adult is about to cross or is crossing while flags are displayed, even if there is no Crossing Supervisor.

Drivers must stop if a handheld "Stop" sign is being displayed.

Drivers must proceed only when all children and adults, **including** the School Crossing Supervisor are clear of the crossing.

Drivers must approach at a speed slow enough to stop safely, if necessary.

Children are unpredictable, drivers should always watch out for children near schools.
